Dear Friends,

As a grassroots organization, James R. Jordan Foundation works to meet the needs of youth who have limited access to resources to succeed academically. Our goal is to help level the playing field for these students, see them advance to higher education and help them reach their highest potential.

During the 2017-18 year, we had the honor of serving 1,899 students and 198 parents and guardians. With support from our partners, we collaborated with 28 professional content experts and 146 volunteers and mentors to bring awareness, discovery and knowledge to our students and families.

The academic achievements of our students reflect the effort and support of the Foundation and its partners. Additionally, we know that parental support is an important contributor to a child's success. Through our Vision for Families program, we help build that support structure. This year, 157 parents and guardians, along with their 243 students, participated in workshops geared towards parent development. Content experts presented on various topics including: health awareness, careers and budgeting.

At the end of the academic year, we had the pleasure of awarding \$85,996 scholarship dollars to 38 students. Christian Gordon, our third highest earner and the recipient of a \$3,225 scholarship, shared his story with the graduates at our high school graduation dinner. He plans to attend DePaul University to pursue a bachelor's degree in business. Current A-Team Scholars at the elementary earned \$12,050 more this year than in the previous year. Through the A-Team Hour, students receive support through mentoring. Throughout the year 38 students participated in mentorship sessions with various professionals in different fields. They received a total of 59 mentoring hours. Personal mentoring and skill-development programming is key to academic success. We will continue to increase our mentor and volunteer base through company partnerships, providing more students with access to mentoring.

This year marked the sixth year of the S.T.E.A.M. program and the outcomes are encouraging. In surveys we administered, students indicated that they could see themselves pursuing education and careers in STEAM fields after participating in the S.T.E.A.M. program. Continued feedback from instructors, students, and other key stakeholders will help us improve and expand the program. This upcoming year holds more promise as we work to better align this program with the Foundation's strategic goals. Our partners and sponsors will present pop-ups to our students during the school day as a part of each school's science block, providing more students with the opportunity to participate in S.T.E.A.M.

Twenty-two students, grades PreK to 4th participated in our Read with Me! program. On average, their reading levels increased by half a grade level. Over 70% of our students are now reading at or above their grade level.

In the upcoming 2018-19 academic year, we will focus on building our S.T.E.A.M. program, increasing our mentor and volunteer base through company partnerships, and enhancing our programs overall. We believe that education and a strong support system are key to helping students and families find a pathway out of poverty. With your continued support and commitment, we can help them advance towards a brighter future together.

The goal of A-Team Scholars is to increase educational opportunities for students in underserved communities. Students in grades 4-12 are awarded scholarship money based on scholastic achievement, character and integrity.

Students receive \$50 for every “A” and \$25 for every “B” earned per quarter in reading, math, writing and science. The scholarship dollars are invested in Bright Directions 529 college savings plans, and are available to the students upon enrollment in higher education, such as college or vocational school.


- Elementary school students' earnings exceeded last year's amount by \$12,050.

S.T.E.A.M.

The James R. Jordan Foundation's S.T.E.A.M. (science, technology, engineering, arts and math) program provides educational opportunities through mentorship and collaborative learning communities. The program is designed to create awareness and encourage youth of African American, Latino and lower socioeconomic backgrounds to participate in S.T.E.A.M. careers.


The year-long program engages students in 6th to 8th grade to utilize critical thinking and learn technological skills beyond the classroom. S.T.E.A.M. invites students to continue developing their skills and widening their professional possibilities, so that they might take advantage of learning opportunities in high school and college, consider careers in S.T.E.A.M. fields and ultimately successfully complete in the global context.





Stages of Saturn

If you want to go to space, better do it in stages. Reaching Earth orbit, and going on to the Moon, requires a multistage rocket, each stage with its own engines and fuel tanks. When a stage has fired its engines and used all its fuel, it can drop away, leaving behind a lighter rocket with stronger acceleration. And each stage can use an engine most suited to its needs. First stages tend to be large and mighty, often with multiple engines, as they must lift the heavy rocket off the ground. Later stages can be sleeker and lighter, with fewer and less powerful engines to propel them in space. Rockets have lifted off with as many as five stages. Saturn V had three stages.






During the school year, students attend Saturday sessions and outings to learn a wide variety of skills and to participate in S.T.E.A.M. subjects. These subjects include - but are not limited to - cybersecurity and its everyday applications, virtual reality, coding, art computation, and network and computer programming. In the summer months, students continue their S.T.E.A.M. education while also gaining self-confidence, cultural awareness, and teamwork skills. S.T.E.A.M. also includes parents.




Maximizing students' potential and opportunities to grow








The 2017-2018 edition of the JRJF S.T.E.A.M. program engaged 156 students in 29 days of activities from July 2017 to April 2018: 15 days during the summer, 11 Saturdays and 3 days of special events.



With information collected from participants, JRJF created 3 outcome indicators for the S.T.E.A.M. program: Score of Interest in S.T.E.A.M. topics; Score of Confidence, which reflects participants' ability in S.T.E.A.M. subjects; and Score of Motivation to work, study and inspire others to have a career in S.T.E.A.M. The score is measured on a range between 0 and 1. The closer the score is to 1, the higher the student's interest/confidence/motivation in S.T.E.A.M.



The Score of Motivation shows students' motivation to work, study and inspire others to have a career in S.T.E.A.M. The score is a range between 0 and 1. The closer the score is to 1, the higher the student's motivation to advance their S.T.E.A.M. education and share their learning with their communities. As we can observe, during the year of 2017-2018 students showed increase in all 3 motivation score indicators.

Family Space Camp

In Spring 2018, four S.T.E.A.M. students and their parents attended Family Space Camp in Alabama. The students and their parents learned about the history of space exploration and the upcoming mission to Mars in 2020. Additionally, they got a glimpse of space through the eyes of the astronauts as they tried on space suits, participated in simulated missions, built and launched rockets, and explored the insides of space modules. Two activities that were favorites for the group were trying out the 1/6th Gravity Chair, a simulator which allowed them to experience what it feels like to walk across the moon, and taking a spin in the Multi-Axis Trainer, which astronauts use to prepare themselves for disorientation that might occur in emergency conditions during flight. The learning experiences at Space Camp as well as the travel to Alabama allowed time for students and parents to bond and build common ground.

“Tamarion has always been curious with electronics and anything like a puzzle. He is always thinking outside of the box because of his TBI, which slows him down some. He tries very hard to learn as much as his class. The S.T.E.A.M. program has opened up a whole new world of science to him. He is very curious and soaks up things like a sponge. I asked him why he wanted to go to Space Camp. He said he has always wanted to know, how do they get the rockets in the air? How do they breathe up there and is it really like the movies?”



In Tamarion’s life, he has just had me to look to, and to help him understand what a man is supposed to do. I always told him he can do anything, even be an astronaut. The experience will be great for him because he is at the age where he does not know what he wants to do in life.




Read with Me! is a strategy-based school day program that motivates youth to excel academically through small group reading and instruction. This literacy program provides appropriate reading intervention to help students meet academic standards and goals. The program sets students up to enter the 5th grade on their targeted reading level to compete with their peers and continue achieving academic success.



When I first met Prentice, a 2nd grader from Sherman School of Excellence, I found him to be a very kind and an intelligent student. He was always willing to expand his knowledge and engage in all the activities. During the Pre-Assessment, I was surprised that he was reading at a 4th grade level. However, he needed help with pronunciation. Throughout the Read with Me! program, we were able to work on this together and Prentice is now reading at a 6th grade level.





Vision for Families addresses issues such as, finance, health, and career readiness for our families. Sherman School of Excellence and the community are thankful for the partnership that the James R. Jordan Foundation has provided and looks forward to its continuation in the future.






Financial Highlights
